

FISHING & HUNTING

Fishing Licenses go on sale March 1st of each year and can be ordered from the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency by phone by dialing 1-888-814-TWRA (8972) or from their web site. Children under 13 do not need a license to fish.

With the combination of the Cherokee National Forest and the Martha B. Sundquist State Forest, there are great hunting opportunities. The forests are home to many species of wildlife, including deer, bear, boar, fox, weasel, opossum, skunk, raccoon, turkey, grouse and various species of waterfowl within the waterways of both forests. THREE RIVERS AND A LAKE

With three rivers and a lake to explore, visitors to Cocke County enjoy abundant opportunities to get on the water. From white water adventures on the Pigeon River to calmer paddling on the Nolichucky and French Broad Rivers to flat water on Douglas Lake, boats of all sizes (kayaks, rafts, pontoons, and motorboats) are common sights in Cocke County.

GREAT SMOKY MOUNTAINS NATIONAL PARK

America's most visited national park is world renowned for its diversity of plant and animal life and the quality of Southern Appalachian mountain culture. Rarely crowded, the Cosby entrance to the Park showcases beautiful wildflowers, moss covered stones and babbling brooks surrounded by old growth forest. With peaceful picnic areas and campgrounds with great hiking trails, the hike to Mount Cammerer Fire Tower provides one of the best views in the Smokies.

CHEROKEE NATIONAL FOREST

The large portion of the Cherokee National Forest in Cocke County offers opportunities for all kinds of outdoor enthusiasts. Hike up to the breathtaking views atop the Meadow Creek Lookout Tower, where viewers get a 360° view of the surrounding countryside. Relax along the trail that runs around Allen Branch Pond. Paddle a kayak down the French Broad, one of the oldest rivers in the world. Or drive quietly along one of the many loops when the rhododendrons are in full bloom.


MARTHA B. SUNDQUIST STATE FOREST

This state forest consists primarily of mature mountain and cove hardwood stands. It features a hiking trail called "Tennessee Gulf Trail."

APPALACHIAN NATIONAL SCENIC TRAIL

The AT is a public footpath covering over 2,180 miles, that traverses the scenic, wooded, pastoral, and wild lands of the Appalachian Mountains.







Ride five miles of white water containing 18 Class II, III and IV rapids on the Upper Pigeon River with professionally guided rafts. A more serene route is available through all rafting companies utilizing the Lower Pigeon River; this more laid-back and scenic section of the river is perfect for a family float. Water release and schedule is set with Walters Power Plant operations and guaranteed water is Memorial Day to Labor Day. BIRD WATCHING

Rankin Bottoms Project - Located on the upper reaches of Douglas Lake, it is aptly described by Michael Sledjeski in a paddlers' quide as "a southern Appalachian bayou." The water levels in certain parts of Rankin are seasonal, so check first before heading out with your canoe or kayak. Rankin is one of the best birding areas in the Southeast and has been recognized by the National Audubon Society as an Important Bird Area. This is the premier site in East Tennessee for warm season waterbirds including Wood Duck, Double-crested Cormorant, Great Egret, Osprey, shorebirds, Cliff Swallow, and Prothonotary Warbler.
